



The Clara Barton Sisterhood

Universalist Clara Barton, one of our most famous foremothers, was a distinguished leader of her day. Noted for organizing nursing services and supplies for soldiers during the Civil War, she was also founder of the American Red Cross and was actively involved in that organization until she was well into her 80s.

In order to both honor her example and celebrate today's women, UUWF created and maintains the Clara Barton Sisterhood. With a donation of \$80 to UUWF, a congregation, an individual, or a women's group can honor a UU woman who is 80 or older and whose life and work you wish to recognize.

Noting that you had come to the X Fellowship after over forty years of membership at the UU Congregation of Y, they wrote that you 'immediately joined our newcomers group and is now doing much to keep all newcomers involved and happy'."

". . . for your lifetime of active involvement in Unitarian Universalism, at both the First Unitarian Society in X – where you served as secretary of the board and comptroller – and at the Unitarian Church in Y, where you served as president of the Women's Alliance from 1997-2001. Your professional career in banking – at a time when it was still largely a man's field – has also been valued and appreciated."

". . . for your active church membership, which has included dedicated involvement in the religious education program as well as service as the congregation's secretary, assistant treasurer, and head of the Music Committee – to mention just a few of the positions you have held. Your strong support of the church's ministers and your participation in wider denominational matters at General Assembly is also being recognized."

". . . for your active membership in the First Unitarian Society of X and in its Women's Alliance - in both you are known as 'a person to approach when there are problems to be solved.' Your service as a member of the church board and many committees - including two Search Committees and the Trust, Aesthetic and Memorial Committees - has been greatly appreciated, as has been your work on the Women's Alliance board and as its program
