More than the fuchsia funnels breaking out of the crabapple tree, more than the neighbor's almost obscene display of cherry limbs shoving their cotton candy-colored blossoms to the slate sky of Spring rains, it's the greening of the trees that really gets to me. When all the shock of white and taffy, the world's baubles and trinkets, leave the pavement strewn with the confetti of aftermath, the leaves come. Patient, plodding, a green skin growing over whatever winter did to us, a return to the strange idea of continuous living despite the mess of us, the hurt, the empty. Fine then, I'll take it, the tree seems to say, a new slick leaf unfurling like a fist to an open palm, I'll take it all.



### Resilience

I can feel the resilience in my achy temples, staying up late to finish a project I'm passionate about for people I love because life intervened earlier in the day. I promise to rest tomorrow.

I can see the resilience in the inch-by-inch progress of unpacking and moving into my new office at my new church. We *will* be spending more time together in this building someday soon.

I can smell the resilience in the homemade stew made by a congregant and offered to me at the end of a really busy week. I thanked his wife only to be set straight about who is the real cook of the household.

As a new minister during the pandemic, I'm learning how to do a job nobody could have trained for. And I'm grateful every day that this is what I get to do. I get to bear witness to the unceasing creativity and generosity of people in community. And then I get to write about it, and speak about it, to them. Together, we reflect and our commitment to our shared future deepens.

I'm developing routines. I'm learning that, in order to listen and write, I have to sleep and eat properly, on a schedule, and I have to meditate and stretch daily. If I'm going to be on a Zoom meeting tonight, I need to take the morning off. I'm learning to follow these guidelines, with wiggle room, because when I push them away too long, my faith falters. If I let my busyness eat up my self care for too long, I end up spinning my wheels and getting nothing done anyway.

Throughout my life, I've identified as a woman and a feminist, but these days, new in ministry, recently transplanted to a new city, and emerging into middle age, are the most authentic expression of that identity I've found. So few of my women ancestors—perhaps none of them—had this kind of opportunity to build a life completely around our chosen values. I'm grateful for the ways they grew towards this possibility and pushed me towards it. And I'm grateful for the circles of support—spread all over the country—that keep me nourished, accountable, and informed. My support network is not all women, but it's fundamentally feminist, thanks in part to women being in the majority in UU ministry since the 90s. And that is thanks, in part, to the powerful organization of Unitarian, Universalist, and UU women for over a century.

I'm filled with hope that more and more of our communities can practice deep listening, consent, collaboration, disruption of harm, direct address, and covenanting. Working with the UUWF board while emerging into ministry is a big part of why I stay hopeful. We are embodying the creativity and resilience of our ancestors in contexts they couldn't have imagined. To their gifts we add our own humor, grace, and persistence.
