## THE PRINCIPLES AND WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP

The UUWF celebrates leaders of all kinds, and works to support women and gender-expansive people across our community of faith. We believe that advancing women's leadership is inextricably bound to upholding the inherent worth and dignity of every person and the pursuit of justice, equity, and compassion in human relations.

Unitarian Universalism calls us to reject systems of oppression that impede our ability to accept one another and encourage spiritual growth. Our faith tradition requires us to resist power structures that prevent us from fully realizing our goal of a world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all. Patriarchy and white supremacy can only be dismantled if we center the leadership of women (both trans and cis) and gender-expansive people.

As of 2018, 57% of UU Ministers were women, and surely that number has climbed since then. But beyond formal congregational leadership, our UU faith says that we all have access to the divine. We all have a duty to support each other as leaders and encourage leadership from all members in our congregations and beyond.

## The Status of Women in Leadership

As of 2020, 35% of top management positions were held by women. This is despite the fact that women made up more than half of the workforce in the United States as of 2021.

As of 2022, women hold 8.8% of leadership positions at Fortune 500 companies. There are a total of 41 women running businesses on the Fortune 500 list, an all-time high.

In 2021, two Black women were running Fortune 500 companies for the first time ever: Roz Brew at Walgreens Boots Alliance and Thasunda Brown Duckett at TIAA.

One research study found that the two biggest challenges keeping women from leadership positions are that women are held to higher standards (43%) and many businesses aren't "ready" to hire women for top executive positions (43%).

Other cited challenges included family responsibilities not leaving enough time for running a major corporation (23%), women not having access to the same kind of connections as men (20%), and women being less likely to ask for promotions and raises (18%).

Women made up 27% of the 117th U.S. Congress. This translates to 144 women out of 539 seats across both the House of Representatives and the Senate. While this is a 50% increase from the previous decade, it's still far from representing the full percentage of the female population.


